KEY ASK: Conduct a comprehensive review of government regulation and policy to enhance sector competitiveness, alleviate cumulative regulatory burden, and ensure that departmental objectives are aligned, for the betterment of Canada's fruit and vegetable supply chain.

KEY ASK: Prioritize the passage of Bill C-280, the Financial Protection for Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Farmers Act to support the long-term viability of Canadian produce businesses.

KEY ASK: Ensure that regulatory and policy initiatives related to produce packaging enable secure access to safe food for all Canadians, align with global practices and policies to safeguard the sustainability and competitiveness of the produce sector, and avoid unintentionally increasing the environmental footprint of the Canadian food supply.
